

Two Injured When Lamb Plane Crashes

Two men live today in St. Anthony's Hospital as a result of a combination of miracles, when a Lamb Airways Norsman crashed onto Grace Lake Tuesday morning, and burned.

Jack Lamb, 21 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Lamb, owes his life to his brother, Douglas, and Jack Abram, aero engineer, was saved by Donald Lamb --- both were dragged from the burning plane in the split seconds before the flames erupted into a gas-fed torch which consumed the aircraft.

Lamb has just taken off from Grace Lake airharbor for Moose Lake with 400 pounds of mail, in heavy gusts of wind. He had flown about five miles and suddenly the plane veered to the left and dropped sharply.

He crash landed the aircraft in the ditch beside the airbase road. At the same time two other Lamb brothers leaped into a taxi which had stood with idling motor and raced to the crash scene. The flames were then billowing about the cabin and Doug Lamb made

two dashes into the fire before he could reach Jack. A shift in wind lifted flames momentarily and he reached him. Heavy clothing of both men was blazing fiercely. They were hurled into the water-filled ditch, then rushed by taxi to St. Anthony's Hospital.

Tom, head of the flying Lamb family and Kenneth Allard raced up to he scene in a jeep within 40 seconds, but the plane at that time was a flaming pyre.

Town police answered a call from the airport with the ambulance, then the fire truck arrived to soak the burning plane.

Mr. Lamb observed that if the plane had crashed a few feet into the muskeg the rescuers would never have been able to reach it in time to drag the men from the flames. The accident mars a 25-year accident free record for the flying Lambs.

Jack Lamb, because of his position in relation to the high wind, which swept the fire over him, was more seriously burned and is to be flown to Winnipeg for additional medical treatment. He also suffered a fractured ankle.

BOY'S BODY FOUND IN BUSH NORTHEAST OF WABOWDEN
